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

The second detachment marches past commanded by Major A. Railton, M.C.



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

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## THE CHINDITS OLD COMRADES' ASSOCIATION

At the suggestion of our Patron, Lord Mountbatten, the various individual Old Comrades' Association organisations throughout the U.K. have now amalgamated into a single national organisation.

It was decided that there should be a National Standard, a symbol of the existence of the Association that would stand the ravages of time and would be for posterity.

A magnificent standard has been produced, hand embroidered in blue and gold silk, depicting the Chindit sign, motto and names of all the units that took part in the campaigns.

It was felt that the Dedication of the Standard should take place in the Midlands, near to our National Headquarters, and on a pleasant Sunday afternoon in June 1973 this was duly carried out at Lichfield Cathedral by the Dean.

Chindits and their families came from all over the World to be present at the Dedication Service which was also attended by representatives of the serving forces to-day who have links with the campaigns of 1942 and 1943.

After the service there was a march through Lichfield, with the salute being taken outside the Guild Hall by the son of General Wingate, Capt. O. J. Wingate, R.H.A.

Afterwards tea was served in the Guild Hall and messages of goodwill were read out by the President of the Chindits Old Comrades' Association, Major General S. A. Cooke.

It is hoped that, at an appropriate time in the future, The Chindit Standard will be laid up in Lichfield Cathedral, Staffordshire, U.K.
